to find evidence of Administration laxity in prosecuting the five-year-old Amerasia case. But it urged a continued study.

Background: Part of the

grand jury's recommendation—that probes into espionage and loyalty be secret-found an echo in Washington. A bill take the "smear" and "white wash" elements from Congressional investigations was introduced in Congress. It would put any probe of "urgentnational importance" under a commission of four Congressmen, three private citizens. Yet despite repeated criticism of the "circus" nature of investigations, such moves for a change were given little chance of passage. Enough evidence of Russian espionage had come out to keep current probes alive.
