

MOST WANTED WOMEN

Here are the six who top the FBI list of most dangerous criminals-at-large; find one and you may prevent murder

■ IF YOU MEASURE a girl's desirability by the number of men who would like to meet her sometime, the most wanted women in the U.S. are not Kim Novak, Jayne Mansfield or Marilyn Monroe.

They are half a dozen women you'd pass on the street without so much as a second glance. Yet thousands of men would rather have an autograph from one of them—on the jail blotter—than a date with Elizabeth Taylor. These men are FBI agents and state and local police. To them, the six ladies on these pages are the stars of the FBI's list of most wanted women.

They are not necessarily the worst law-breakers. Even murderers don't make the list until they violate Federal statutes by crossing state lines. And most women who become eligible are caught before there is time to pin up their posters.

Of the six who are now most-sought-after by the men in uniform, only two rate flattering words on their posters. One, Angelina Connelly, is said to be "pleasant" and "diminutive"; the other, Maizie Jean Lambert, is called "a ravishing brunette."

As for the others—their most persistent suitors think of them chiefly in terms such as "face marked with pimples," "front teeth in poor condition," and "may be armed . . . dangerous . . ."

The six pin-ups are wanted for such crimes as bank robbery, being an accessory to murder, and jail break. If you see one of them, don't whistle—make for the nearest telephone booth.

ANGELINA CONNELLY



Angelina ("Angie") Connelly is 34 years old. Quiet, well-dressed and pleasant, she was well-liked as a receptionist.

But she is wanted in connection with one of the largest armed bank robberies in our history.

In 1955, three men carrying guns held up a bank at Woodside, Queens, N.Y., and got away with over \$300,000.

Neither Angie nor her husband, believed to have been one of the robbers, has been seen since. Their two small children were abandoned, one in a church, the other in a five-and-ten-cent store.

Angie is a slender 5'2"—but the FBI says she carries a long-bladed knife most of the time and knows how to use it.

MILDRED BEATRICE MUNN



Mildred Beatrice Munn, 24, is only 5'2", weighs no more than 150 pounds. She has a light-brown, oblong birthmark about 2 inches long on one ankle (the description doesn't say which one). Her hair may now have been cut short.

On January 17, 1957, she, with ex-convict Aubrey Gilding Wright and two other men, allegedly robbed a man at gunpoint in Glasgow, Va., then disappeared.

The FBI believes Mildred is still traveling with Wright. They may be in the South. Wright, badly crippled by arthritis, needs the sunshine. An attractive six-footer, he walks with a limp.

If they are cornered, both Mildred and Wright will probably shoot to kill.

MAIZIE JEAN LAMBERT



Maizie Jean Lambert, the 30-year-old "ravishing brunette," started [REDACTED] her child [REDACTED] bert.

Yvonne Conley, 46, is wanted for the most serious crime of all the FBI's most wanted women: accessory to murder.

She is believed to have fled the law with George Edward Cole, 32, a hoodlum charged with fatally shooting a San Francisco police officer. Requiring constant treatment for chronic liver trouble and asthma with drugs obtainable only by prescription, she must live virtually from doctor to doctor.

A dumpy 4'11" and 140 pounds, she is an odd companion for Cole, 6'1" and 14 years her junior.

Both Yvonne and Cole are considered highly dangerous. He has promised to shoot any policeman who tries to take him. Yvonne may be right there—with a gun.

RUTH PAIGE BOGLI



Ruth Paige Bogli, 35, was born in Epping, N.H. Raised a ward of the state, she was married and divorced by the time she was 23, first got into trouble with the cops in 1946 on charges of abandoning her two children in Atlantic City.

A year later she and a boy friend were nabbed while breaking and entering in Massachusetts. She was sent to a reformatory for five years, but broke out in 1949. The FBI took up the hunt for her when the State of Massachusetts reported she crossed state lines.

Ruth may be wearing men's clothes she's known to have bought in Buffalo. If you think you see her, look for scars on her right eyebrow and inner right wrist. Then look out—she has a gun.

JANETT CARROLL CRUSENBERRY



Janett Carroll Crusenberry is 28, average in build; hair and eyes medium brown. But her manner is described as "vicious and coarse."

She was working as a waitress in Cincinnati when she met experienced bank robber Howard John Hansen, went along with him to hold up a bank in Poplar Grove,
