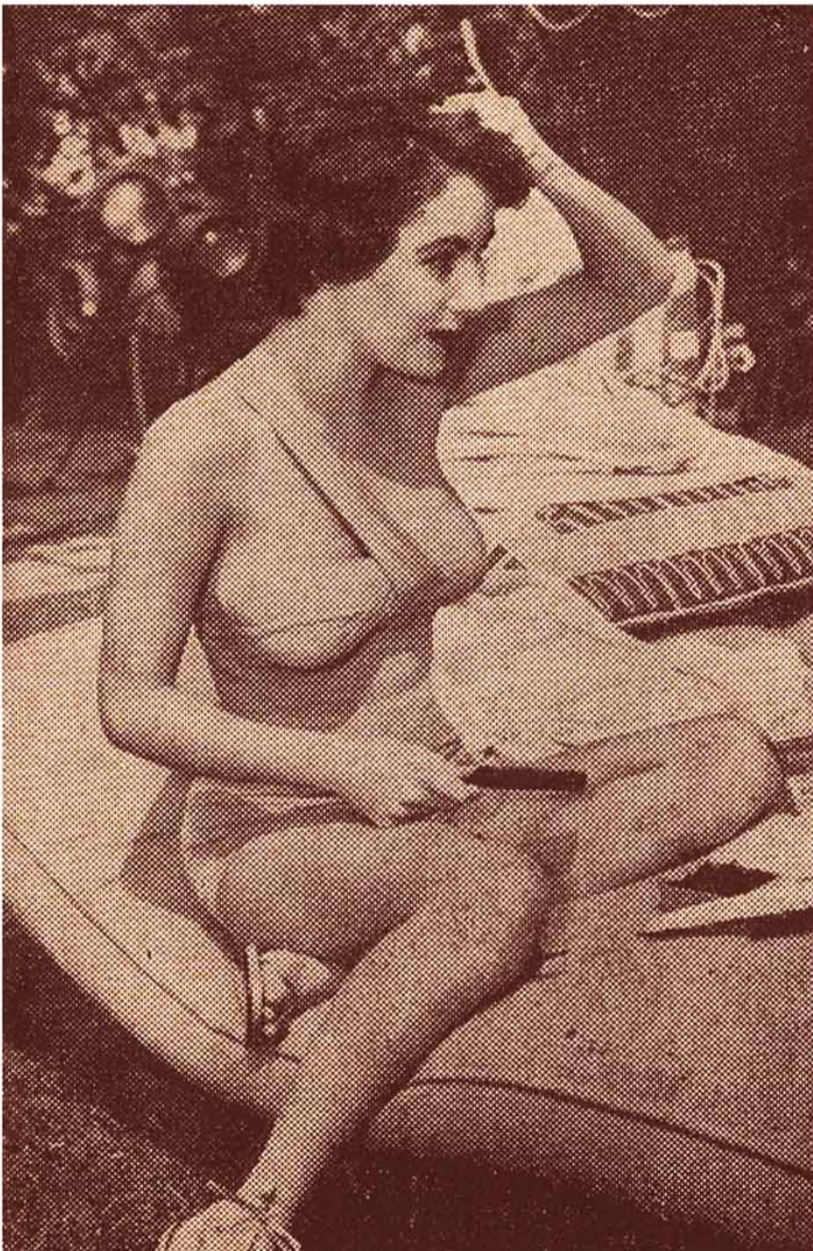


Tension—Tokyo

TOKYO (From QUICK's Bureau): The screening in Japanese theaters of *Sands of Iwo Jima*, starring John Wayne as one of the U. S. Marines who took the island, is not helping Japanese-American relations. Though the Japanese distributor said he cut some scenes to make the film more palatable, one Tokyo correspondent called the showing "shortsighted and calculated to do a great deal of harm." Others felt it would engender anti-U. S. feelings and fear of the U. S. The film most antagonized older Japanese. One 50-year-old man said: "This picture is one-sided . . . gets on our nerves." A middle-aged woman: "My

heart was filled with inexplicable emotion thinking of the dead who still sleep on that island." But an 18-year-old girl said: "It was terrific. Nobody who sees it would want another war."
