


Bright flame ribbonzene lace in a dance dress ornamented with jewels, sequins, ribbon rosettes. By Miss America


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## Fashion in Living

Because it has an ageless quality, which makes it look well on women of any age, its uses are varied. This season it is treated in new ways by some of the top couturiers. It is embroidered, used as appliqué, beaded or scattered with sequins. It is tailored, cut into smart little evening jackets, used bountifully in great sweeping evening gowns. In brilliant colors it becomes sophisticated. In pastels it becomes naive. There is variety in lace itself. It may be gossamer sheer, or rich and handsome in design. But whatever its form, it is a universal fashion favorite.



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For dinner or theatre Dior-New York uses lace that is hand-painted in red, beige or black.
