Negro Jailed As 'Traitor'

Reported to Have Said: 'This Is a White Man's War'

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 16.—A Negro truck driver was held yesterday on charges of treason by Magistrate Thomas O'Hara. He was accused of saying "this is a white man's war."

He is Harry Carpenter, 34. He was arrested by Negro MPs from the 76th Coast Artillery, in a raid on a reputed South Philadelphia gambling house frequented by soldiers.

According to testimony before O'Hara, Carpenter told Sgt. Edward Simms, Negro

MP, 25 years in the Army:

"You're a crazy n · · · · r wearing that uniform—you're only out fighting for white trash. This is a white man's Government and war and it's no damned good."

O'Hara, who freed 11 others on bail on gambling charges, held Carpenter without bail on a charge of treason on the advice of A. V. Cortese, Assistant District Attorney.

Cortese later said:

"The charge probably should have been sedition. Sedition is where a person incites disruption of the machinery of Government."

The state antisedition law provides penalties up to 20 years in jail and a \$10,000 fine. But the Carpenter case, apparently regarded as a hot potato, is being referred to U. S. Attorney Gerald Gleeson, who said he would investigate and prosecute "if the facts . warrant it." Gleeson had no comment to make on Attorney General Biddle's instructions that no sedition prosecution be begun without his approval. Carpenter is a Republican, 3-A in the draft. His wife Mary says he's "ready to go,

and never talked against the Government.

Drinking might have made him loosetongued."
